

Florida RNs with an ADN as their highest degree are...

49.3% of all RNs with clear and active FL licenses **48.6%** of all RNs estimated to be working in Florida

17% of ADN RNs with active FL licenses plan to **reduce hours, leave** Florida, and/or retire within 12 months of their license renewal, representing almost 22,000 RNs in the potential workforce.

ADN FACULTY SUPPLY

Pre-licensure ADN programs had 1,144 full-time and 1,703 part-time faculty in AY 2018-19. Programs reported **93 FT and 107 PT vacancies** and a **perceived need for 155 more FT ADN** faculty positions not currently included in their budget.

Increasing the number of full-time faculty has been linked to higher firsttime NCLEX pass rates (Odom-Maryon, et al., 2018).

ADN EDUCATION PROGRAMS



In Fall 2019, there were 143 active ADN programs in Florida.

115 responding ADN programs with students actively enrolled reported 112 generic and 55 bridge curricula. In total, 23,593 students were enrolled in an ADN program and 9,670 graduated from ADN programs in AY 2018-19.

ADN NCLEX PASSAGE RATES




66% of ADN graduate first-time exam takers passed the NCLEX in 2019.

Public programs had a higher success rate (89%), followed by non-profit private programs (84%), and private, for-profit programs (59%).

Florida's ADN passage rates for all program types decreased since 2018 and fell below the 2019 national ADN passage rate (85.2%).*
