RN characteristics are based on responses to FCN's survey of nurses renewing licenses during the 2018-2019 renewal cycle. Counts should be interpreted as estimates only.


Florida RNs with a BSN as their highest degree are...

42.0% of RNs with active FL licenses

43.1% of RNs estimated to be working in Florida

17%

of BSN RNs with active FL licenses plan to **reduce hours**, **leave Florida**, **and/or retire** within 12 months of their license renewal, representing almost 18,000 RNs in the potential workforce.



BSN FACULTY SUPPLY

Pre-licensure BSN programs had 1,085 full-time and 1,252 part-time faculty in AY 2018-19. Programs reported 109 FT and 48 PT vacancies and a perceived need for 111 more FT BSN faculty positions not currently included in their budget.

Increasing the number of full-time faculty has been linked to higher first-time NCLEX pass rates (Odom-Maryon, et al., 2018).

BSN EDUCATION PROGRAMS

In Fall 2019, there were 81 active prelicensure BSN programs in Florida.

67 responding BSN programs with students actively enrolled reported **58 generic and 27 second degree BSN curricula. 54 RN to BSN programs** had students enrolled in Fall 2019. In total, 13,448 students were enrolled in BSN programs, and 23,754 graduated from a BSN program in AY 2018-19.


BSN NCLEX PASSAGE RATES



89% of BSN graduates passed the NCLEX in 2019.

Public programs had a higher success rate (93%), followed by non-profit private programs (87%), and private, for-profit programs (85%).

Florida's public program total passage rate was higher than the 2019 national BSN passage rate (91.2%), while the total passage rate among private programs fell slightly below the national rate.
