

# LPN NURSES IN FLORIDA

## LPN SUPPLY



LPN characteristics are based on responses to FCN's survey of nurses renewing licenses during the 2016–2017 renewal cycle. Counts should be interpreted as estimates only.

### Among Florida LPNs with active FL licenses...

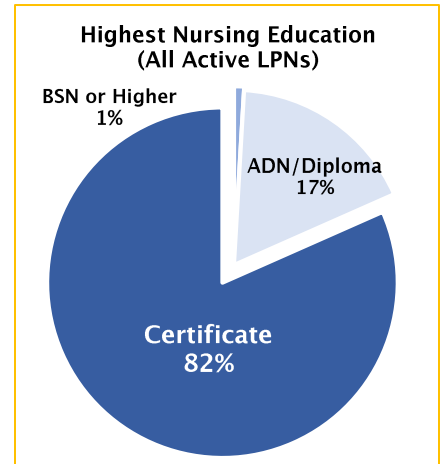
**81.6%** hold an LPN certificate as their highest nursing degree

24.4% of LPN certificate holders also have an associate degree or higher in a non-nursing field

**84.9%** of LPNs are estimated to be working in Florida

**13%**

of LPNs with active FL licenses reported plans to **reduce working hours, leave Florida, and/or retire** within 12 months of their license renewal



## LPN FACULTY SUPPLY

LPN programs had 390 full-time and 420 part-time faculty in AY 2017–18. Programs reported **33 FT and 52 PT vacancies** and a **perceived need for 59 more FT LPN faculty** positions not currently included in their budgets.

Increasing full-time faculty has been linked to higher first-time NCLEX pass rates (Odom–Maryon, et al., 2018).

## LPN EDUCATION PROGRAMS

In Fall 2018, there were **137 active LPN programs in Florida.**



Responding programs reported students enrolled in 95 generic LPN programs. In total, 4,986 students were reported to be enrolled in LPN programs, and 2,842 graduated from LPN programs in AY 2017–18.

## LPN NCLEX PASSAGE RATES

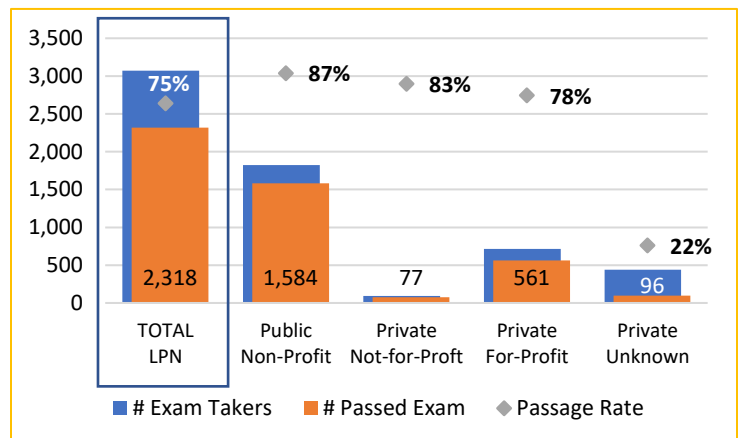


**75.4% of LPN graduates passed the NCLEX in 2018.**

Public programs had a higher success rate (86.8%), followed by non-profit private programs (82.8%), and private, for-profit programs (78.5%).

**Florida's LPN passage rates for all program types except public, non-profit programs fall below the 2018 national average (85.9%) for LPN programs, on average. \***
