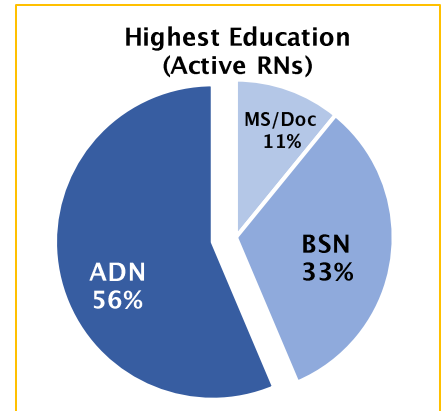


RN characteristics are based on responses to FCN's survey of nurses renewing licenses during the 2016–2017 renewal cycle. Counts should be interpreted as estimates only.

Florida RNs with an ADN as their highest degree are...

- 56.4% of all RNs with active FL licenses
- 56.2% of all RNs estimated to be working in Florida

17% of ADN RNs with active FL licenses reported plans to **reduce working hours, leave Florida, and/or retire** within 12 months of their license renewal



ADN FACULTY SUPPLY

Pre-licensure ADN programs had 1,087 full-time and 1,564 part-time faculty in AY 2017–18. Programs reported **95 FT and 123 PT vacancies** and a **perceived need for 131 more FT ADN** faculty positions not currently included in their budget.

Increasing the number of full-time faculty has been linked to higher first-time NCLEX pass rates (Odom–Maryon, et al., 2018).

ADN EDUCATION PROGRAMS



In Fall 2018, there were 143 active pre-licensure ADN programs in Florida.

Responding programs reported students enrolled in 107 generic ADN programs and 45 bridge ADN programs. In total, 22,402 students were reported to be enrolled in an ADN program, and almost 9,000 graduated from an ADN program in AY 2017–18.

ADN NCLEX PASSAGE RATES

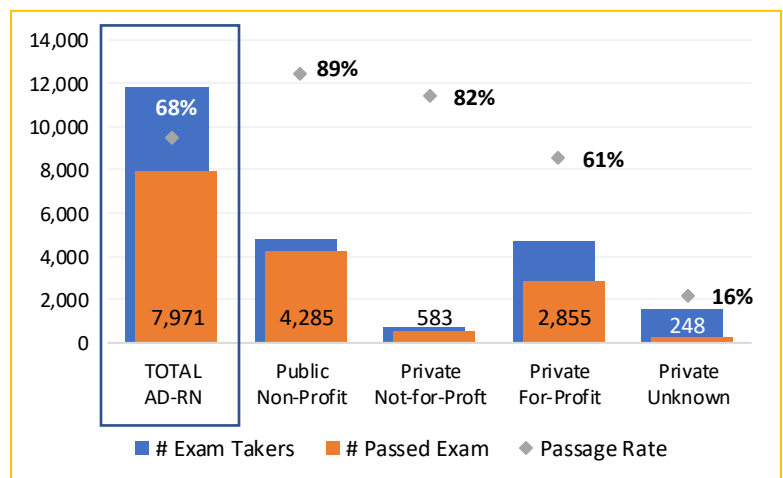


68% of ADN graduates passed the NCLEX in 2018.

Public programs had a higher success rate (89%), followed by non-profit private programs (82%), and private, for-profit programs (61%).

Florida's ADN passage rates for all program types fell below the 2018 national average (85.1%) for ADN programs, on average. *
